Mayoral Citation:

Councillor Michael Brunt, Mayor of Merton 2021-2022

Resolved unanimously: that the council places on record its sincere thanks and appreciation to Councillor Michael Brunt for the dedicated manner in which he has served as Mayor of the London Borough of Merton for the year 2021-2022.

Councillor Brunt was elected to the council in 1990 and has served as a councillor for 18 of the last 32 years. Elected Mayor at a virtual meeting in April 2021, Councillor Brunt took over from Lower Morden Councillor Sally Kenny and started his official duties on May 19. Councillor Brunt most recently represented Figge's Marsh Ward and is a former leader of Merton Council and a former Cabinet Member for the Environment.

Two of his grandparents were born in the borough in the 1890s, and his parents lived all their lives in the borough. Councillor Brunt was also born in Merton and grew up in the borough.

Councillor Brunt developed a passion for healthcare during six years spent working for the Donald Woods Foundation and for HIV charities in South Africa. As he helped lead Merton out of the COVID-19 pandemic, his theme for the year focused on health, care and wellbeing.

Councillor Brunt selected the Christian Care Association as the first of his two nominated charities. The association provides emotional support and practical help for people who have no recourse to public funds.

His second charity was Marie Curie, the UK's leading end-of-life charity. Marie Curie provides frontline nursing and hospice care, as well as a free support line for those coping will terminal illnesses.

Councillor Brunt has helped raise more than £58,000 for his chosen charities. Fundraising highlights during the year included a sleepout for 60 people at AFC Wimbledon in November. The event was organised by the Dons Action Group and raised £44,000 for three local charities.

He also organised a charity cricket match for the Mayor's XI against a team from Mitcham Cricket Club, which was played on reportedly the oldest pitch in the country. Councillor Brunt then hosted teas and tours at the All England Lawn Tennis and Croquet Club — the variety for the first Mayor's Ball since 2019 — as well as at Plough Lane.

Councillor Brunt presented the freedom of the borough to Dickle Guy at AFC Wimbledon's ground. As a season-ticket holder, Councillor Brunt was privileged to watch the side in their first full season back in the borough, and he was also delighted to welcome the London Broncos to Merton. In recognition of Silver Sunday, a celebration of older people that also tackles issues of social isolation, Councillor Brunt hosted an afternoon tea at Tooting and Mitcham Hub.

Aside from his charity work, Councillor Brunt led the tributes to fallen servicemen and servicewomen on Armistice Day and Remembrance Sunday, and he led citizenship ceremonies throughout the year as part of his civic duties. With a focus on promoting community spirit as Merton recovered from the pandemic, Councillor Brunt championed testing and vaccination, and he visited more than half the schools in the borough to highlight how Merton could become a positive example for more local boroughs.

Councillor Brunt's joint chaplains are Rev Belemo Alagoa and Rev Alison Judge from the Merton Priory team. The Mayor has been supported throughout by his consort, his mother, Joan Brunt, and by the Deputy Mayor, Councillor Edith Macauley MBE.

The Mayor has conducted approximately 300 engagements, which include 70 citizenship ceremonies and 30 school visits.

Councillor Brunt's mayoralty will be remembered for the way in which he prioritised health and wellbeing and engaged with young people in Merton's schools. Merton runs through Councillor Brunt to his core and he's extremely passionate about safeguarding the borough's future. Through his charity work and civic duties, he encapsulated the borough's strong collective spirit. He's been especially impressed by the way communities have come together over the year as Merton recovers from the pandemic.
